
PROJECT TEAM

Following the necessary closure of the unsafe Kingfisher building in 2019, and the responsible decision to revise proposals following the unprecedented national financial picture in March 2023, the council has worked at pace to bring forward new proposals.

Facilities within the new leisure centre have been informed by a strategic review of leisure needs within the borough, as well as the extensive feedback provided during the three rounds of engagement in 2021 and 2022.

The centre will be managed and operated by a leisure operator (to be appointed) on behalf of the Council.










Committed To Delivery

Following the June 2023 committee decision to bring forward a revised and affordable design for the new leisure centre, the project has progressed at pace with initial designs.

The reimagined leisure centre will sit in the same location and improves upon the offer found in the Kingfisher Leisure Centre when it was open, taking on board the community feedback already received, and the strategic review of leisure needs.



Feedback Taken on Board

Extensive consultation was undertaken with our communities and key stakeholders in 2021 and 2022. This was to make sure that we understood what people wanted to see in their new leisure centre in order to create the project brief. The feedback is summarised as follows:

ENGAGEMENT TO DATE

- 3 rounds of engagement so far...
- 12 public events, either in person or online
- Over **7,000** responses to the engagement
- 390 people attending events

- Numerous meetings with local stakeholders
- **Hundreds** of conversations via email or phone
- Continued to **engage** with local schools and residents and keep them updated on the project

PREVIOUS PUBLIC FEEDBACK

Make sure the new community facility is fun and family friendly:

• We will be providing a range of activities for all ages, including a learner pool with movable floor and interactive 'splash deck', and separate soft play facility.

Target the highest possible accessibility standards:

- We are committed to making this a highly accessible community facility for everyone to enjoy.
- We will continue to engage with disability groups, and those that have a lived experience of disability, to ensure we are doing all we can.

Be ambitious for the sporting facilities - many people wanted to see Kingston residents competing in Olympic swimming:

• This will be an exceptional sporting facility, including a 25m 8-lane competitive swimming pool designed collaboratively with Swim England and local sports and aquatics clubs.

A new leisure centre is a major priority and should be delivered as soon as possible:

• We are committed to delivering this new leisure facility as a key priority, and look to be on site starting construction in 2025, subject to achieving planning permission and the appointment of a contractor.

You were concerned about the environmental impact of redevelopment:

• The council is working hard to make sure that the building is environmentally friendly. One of the ways we are doing this is by making the building all electric, with power being supported by solar panels and heat being generated by air source heat pumps. There will be no gas within the building, and the aim is for the building to achieve BREEAM Excellent.







Revised Proposals


Using the feedback we have previously heard from our communities and stakeholders, as well as the strategic review into the leisure needs we have across the borough, the outline plans for the new centre include:

- A 25m, 8 lane swimming pool with a movable floor and seating for 150 spectators
- A 20m x 10m learner pool with a movable floor and interactive splash pad
- A fitness gym
- A group cycling studio
- 3 studio spaces
- A 4 court sports hall
- 2 squash courts
- A health suite
- A cafe
- A soft play space
- Upgraded play area in the Fairfield East green space

The reimagined leisure centre improves upon the offer found in the Kingfisher Leisure Centre, as detailed below:


